A regional hub in the Cariboo, Williams Lake is surrounded by forests, grasslands, lakes and trail networks.

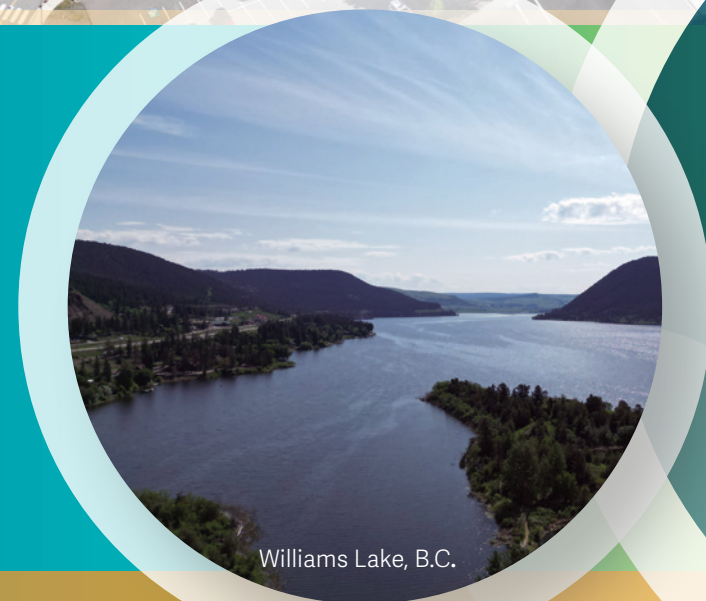

The region TRU serves also extends into the territories of the St'át'imc, Nlaka'pamux, Nuxalk, Tšilhqot'in, Dakelh and Syilx peoples.

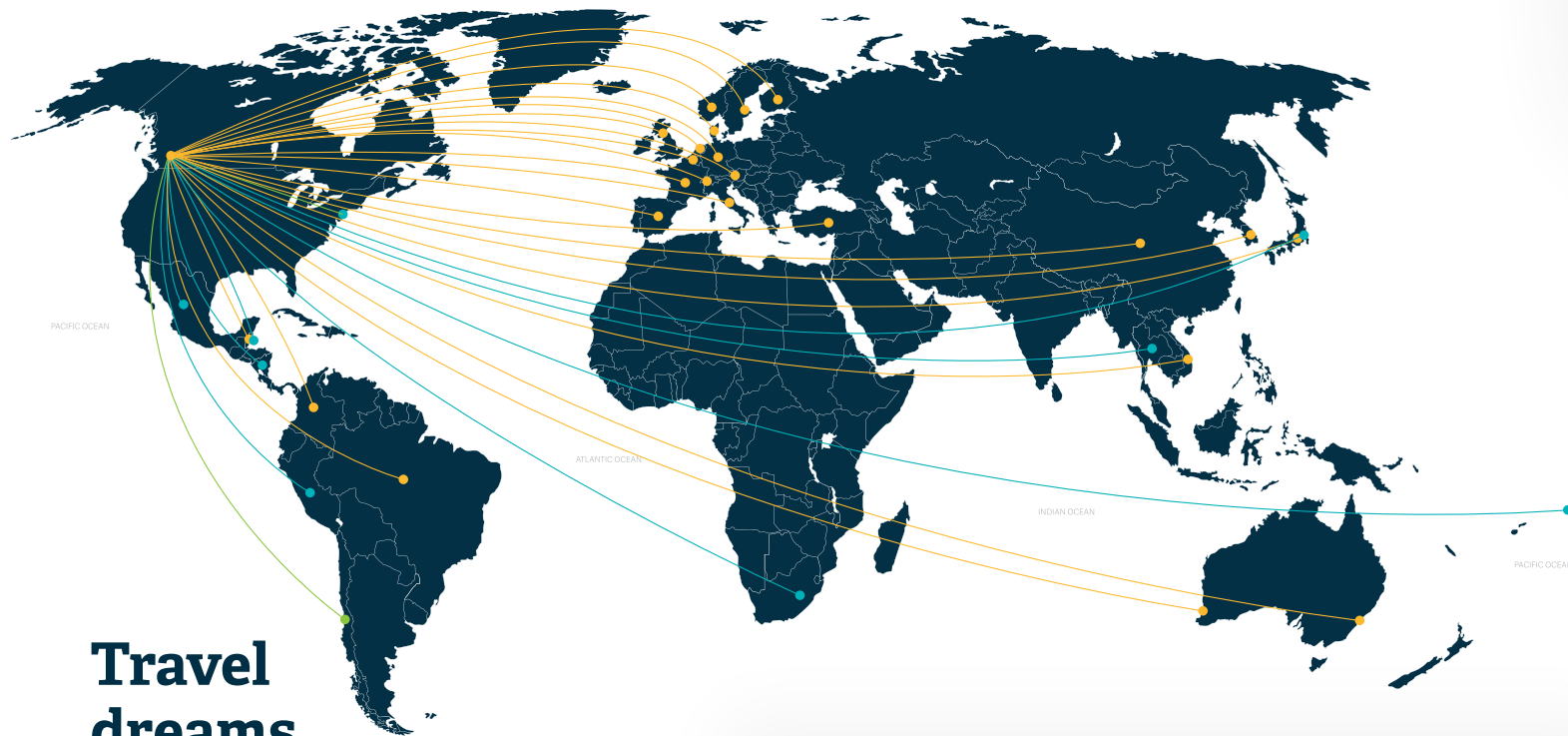

HOW TO APPLY

General admission requirements

Applicants for undergraduate programs on campus must qualify under one of the following categories:

- Graduate from a recognised high school curriculum, or
- Complete 12 or more credits of transferrable post-secondary coursework, or
- Be 19 years of age or older with no formal education in the past 2 years (some program restrictions apply).

English language requirements:

- Grade 12 English or equivalent with minimum 73% for undergraduate degrees or 67% for diploma or certificate programs.

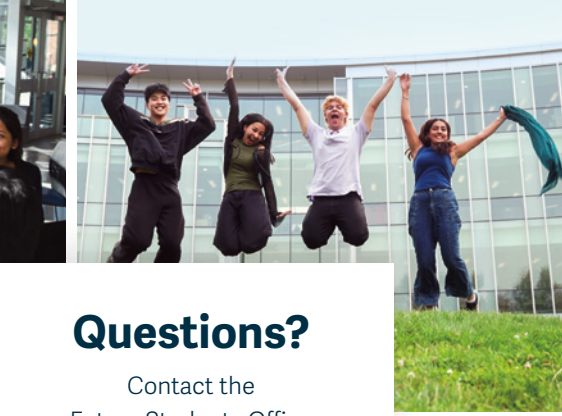

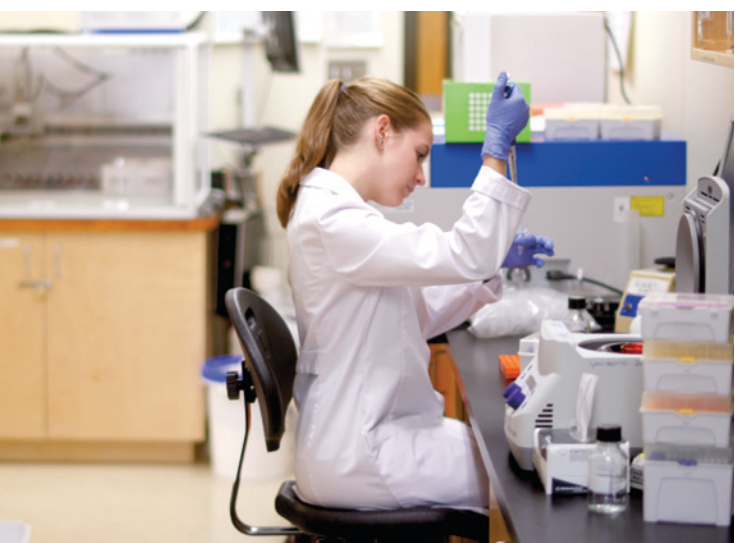
Why self-identify as Indigenous on your application?

TRU applications have an optional and confidential section on Indigenous self-identification. Checking “yes” connects you with services and events of interest. Some TRU programs also allocate seats to those who self-identify as Indigenous. You may also be eligible for priority housing in Kamloops.

APPLY EARLY



Some programs have limited capacity.



FLEXIBLE LEARNING AND DELIVERY MODES

At TRU, you can choose how you want to learn. Study in person, online, or through flexible course formats that fit your schedule, location and learning style. Options will vary by program and course.

IN-PERSON LEARNING

Learn face-to-face with instructors and classmates in a structured, supportive environment. Build connections, take part in campus life, and gain hands-on experience in classrooms, labs, studios or community settings.

BLENDED LEARNING

Take courses that combine scheduled in-person instruction with scheduled virtual online instruction. This format brings together on-campus learning and online participation within the same course experience.

MULTI-ACCESS LEARNING

Choose to attend a scheduled course in person or join the same course virtually online in real time. This option lets you select the format that works best for your location and learning preferences.

ONLINE LEARNING

Learn from anywhere with online options that fit your schedule. Take scheduled, organized courses through online delivery, or enrol anytime in independent, self-paced courses and programs through Open Learning.
